



Rehabilitation of the Bomi County Administration Building

- Built in 1968 by the then Liberia Mining Company (LMC)
- 8,200 square feet
- Complete rehabilitation
- Reconstruction began in October 2007
- Completed in March 2007
- \$14,000 office furniture provided

The Bomi County Administration Building rehabilitation project is one of ten administration buildings that are being, or have been, rehabilitated by USAID's LCIP at a total investment equal to \$2M USD since 2005. Seven have been completed, including Bomi County. Rehabilitation of other County Administration Buildings currently underway are Lofa, Sinoe and Maryland Counties.

The rehabilitation began in October 2007 under a Grant to the Ministry of Internal Affairs in the amount of \$190,000 USD and was completed in six months.

The t-shaped building was massively looted during the prolonged civil crisis. Prior to rehabilitation, it stood as a skeleton requiring a complete new roof, ceiling, doors, windows, plumbing and electrical systems.

The major rehabilitation included:

- Complete reconstruction of roof and ceiling
- Installation of new doors, frames, windows, and tiles
- Repair of damaged walls and floors
- Complete rehabilitation of sewer, electrical and plumbing systems
- Landscaping
- Perimeter security fence
- 65 Kva generator
- New water tower
- 9 Air conditioners
- Office furniture

The building is used by line ministries and county authorities of government, including the County Superintendent, Circuit Court, County Inspector, Labor and Land Commissioners.

Bomi County was originally a territory. It was one of four counties created in 1985. Its administrative Capital, Tubmanburg, is named after Liberia's 18th President William V.S. Tubman.
